Half of all San Francisco students live in low-income households. Only 16% of students from low-income households earn a bachelor's degree (compared to 66% of their more affluent peers).

SMART is advancing a vision of equitable pathways to college for every student in San Francisco. We support Scholars and families to dream big. We pride ourselves on building relationships based on trust, accompanying families each step of their journey toward a college degree.

Hundreds of SMART alumni have already earned their college degrees and were in the first generation in their families to do so. They are now successful professionals working in research, law, education, business, engineering, medicine, and more.

Our Mission + Vision

SMART champions education equity by supporting students in overcoming systemic barriers on their journey to a college degree.

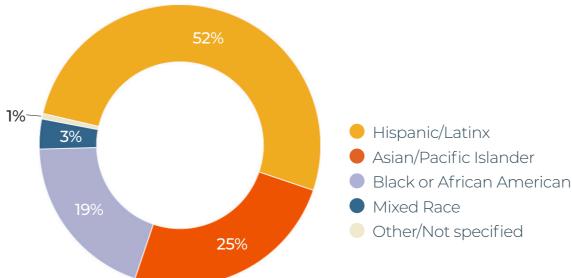
We envision a community with equitable pathways to college graduation for every student in San Francisco – and we work towards that vision by providing students and families academic, social, and emotional support, as well as college preparation and career exploration.

Shaping Our Future

- Over the last decade, 100% of SMART Scholars have graduated high-school and 95% have matriculated to college, compared to an 83% high school graduation rate in California and a nationwide 51% college matriculation rate of their low-income peers.
- While the national college graduation rate for students from low-income households is 16%, SMART Scholars are 4 times more likely to graduate from college.
- Of the SMART Scholars who started college in the last 6 years, 81% have either graduated or are persisting in college.

Our Scholars

- SMART families are in the lowest income quartile in San Francisco, earning less than \$40,000 on average.
- More than 97% of SMART Scholars will be the first in their families to graduate from college.
- 4 of every 5 SMART Scholars primarily speak a language other than English at home.



College = Opportunity

On average, Americans with bachelor's degrees receive the following benefits in comparison to high school graduates who never attend college:

- Double lifetime earnings
- Life expectancy is seven years longer
- Incidence of poverty is 3x lower
- 14% more likely to be employed

Our Award-Winning 12-Year Program Model



SMART identifies curious and motivated 4th grade students facing barriers to opportunity through a network of elementary schools and community-based organizations in San Francisco.



Our six-week summer program for rising 5th grade students prevents summer learning loss through literacy, math, science, media, dance, coding, sports, and enrichment activities, in addition to STEM-based field trips. Our regular after-school program prepares 5th grade Scholars for success in middle school, with added tutoring support. Additionally, we guide families through the complex middle school enrollment processes, offering support with admissions, financial aid, and school advocacy, while also conducting tours and workshops to empower families to become strong educational champions.



middle school achievement 6th - 8th grade A weekly after-school program equipping our middle school Scholars with the skills needed to succeed in school and in life through tutoring, mentoring, and a curriculum designed to bolster them academically, socially, and emotionally. SMART also guides families through the complex high school enrollment processes, offering assistance with admissions and financial aid, school advocacy, tours, and empowering workshops to help families become strong educational champions.



college achievement 9th - 12th grade Weekly programming supports our Scholars in career and college exploration, offering assistance with the college and financial aid application process, while emphasizing the importance of community engagement and self-advocacy. Workshops build on the foundational skills introduced in middle school and expanded through high school to cover more comprehensive aspects of college readiness, ensuring they are well-prepared for the challenges and opportunities ahead.

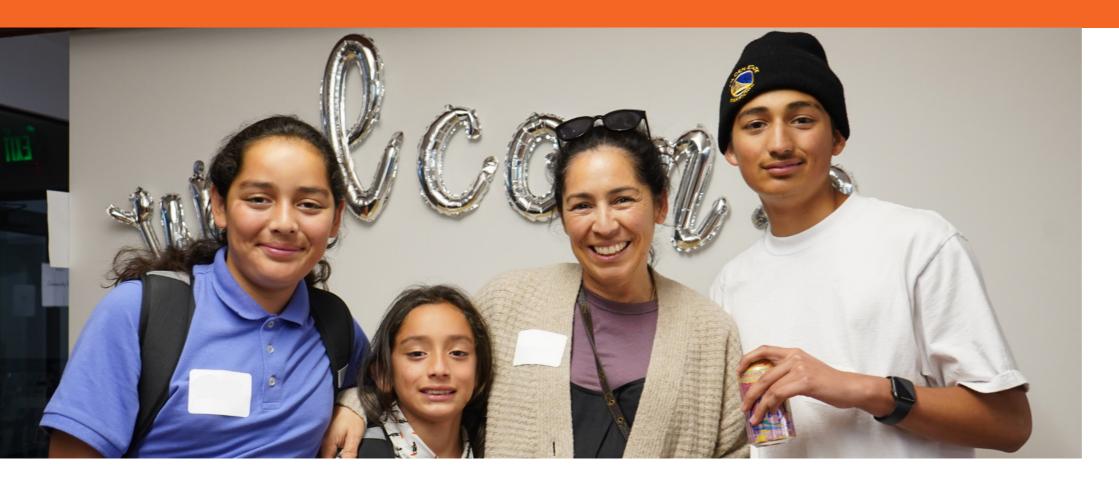

In college, Scholars receive ongoing support through regular check-ins, ensuring they meet college and major requirements, connecting students to campus resources and affinity groups, reminding them about financial aid and housing deadlines, assisting with class enrollment, providing career and graduate school readiness guidance, and monitoring their social and emotional well-being.

Deeper Dive into Our 2024-2027 Strategic Priorities

Priority 1: Strengthen Scholar Support

Rationale: We are continuing to see the lasting effects of the pandemic on the academic, social, and emotional progress of youth. These effects are exacerbated for students from low-income households and students who will be the first generation in their families to earn a college degree. Thus, the key strategies under this priority emphasize early intervention support for middle school preparation, as well as an even more intentional focus on college persistence.

Strengthen Scholar preparation for middle school



Increase college persistence support

Key Performance Indicators:

- College enrollment rate: 95%
- 4-Year College graduation rate: 70%
- Student retention rate: 90%
- Middle School after-school program attendance rate: 75%
- % of Scholars who are UC eligible: 90% CSU eligible: 95%
- % of Scholars enrolling in high-retention* colleges: 60%

^{* (&}quot;High-retention" refers to colleges with a 90% persistence rate and/or an 80% graduation rate)

Priority 2: Grow Our Program Reach

Rationale: SMART's vision is that all students in San Francisco have an equitable pathway to a college degree. There is a great need for our program, as half of all students in San Francisco are from low-income households, and are far less likely to graduate from college. This strategic priority focuses on increasing the number of students we serve directly in our program from 5th grade through college graduation.

Strategy:



Increase number of students served in cohorts 5th grade through college

Key Performance Indicators:

• Number of students served in 2027 (10% increase in Scholars served 5th grade thru college): 515

Priority 3: Building Capacity and Sustainability

Rationale: Over the last several years SMART has shown tremendous resilience and growth. Despite the headwinds of the pandemic, SMART has continued to serve more students, innovate our program, and embrace technology to drive efficiencies and impact. As we continue to grow our impact in the future, we will continue to codify our systems, adopt new technologies, maintain our financial sustainability, and continue establishing SMART as a best-in-class program and place to work.
